BRITISH **FORMULA 3**

The British Formula 3 Championship is set to go down to the wire this year. Unlike previous seasons, where the destiny of the title has often been settled before the end of August, 1995 is going to be a battle to the end of the arduous 18 race championship.

For the most prestigious meeting of the year at Pembrev, the Formula 3 teams have a pair of races on Sunday and with 42 points available to be won - or lost this weekend it is going to be a very significant meeting on the F3 calendar.

Prior to the most recent round at Snetterton, Ralph Firman was starting to look like he had the title in his grasp. However, it could not have gone more wrong for him at his home track in Norfolk. He collided with Warren Hughes as they fought for second when Ralph's foot became stuck under the pedal. Neither driver was able to finish the race.

To make it an even more costly day for Firman, the race was won by Oliver Gavin - his fourth victory of the season and suddenly a 36 point lead was slashed to just 17 points.


Winning the British Formula 3 title is recognised the world over as a very important step on the route to Grand Prix stardom and the quality of entry reflects this. Ambitious young drivers from all over the world will be racing at Pembrey this weekend.

Firman, in his first season of Formula 3 has had a superb season with five wins already to his credit. But this talented teenager wants nothing less than the title in his Paul Stewart Racing entry and will be determined to win again at Pembrey.

Gavin, too, wants the title having stepped back from Formula 3000 to rebuild his career. He was runner-up to Kelvin Burt in 1993 and will not want to be runner-up again.

The third of the leading title contenders is young Brazilian Helio Castro Neves team mate to Firman. Though he has only one once this year, consistent top six finishes mean that he is well in touch with Firman and Gavin. Unlike his rivals, however, Castro Neves has not yet raced at Pembrey.

Still pitching for the title is French teenager Jeremie Dufour who could

make a late bid for the title if he can pull back points on Firman and Gavin this weekend. He must add to his single victory to stay in the championship hunt.

For the rest of the field the title may be out of reach but there is still much to prove. Brazilians Gualter Salles and Cristiano da Matta both have won once so far this year, while British drivers like Hughes, Steve Arnold, Jamie Davies and James Matthews are all potential race winners in this very high quality entry.

Class B is for cars at least one year old and provides a 'race within a race'. Martin Byford has a firm grip on the class after a superb season with his family team but South African youngster Werner Lupberger is gaining pace as the year

progresses. A recent impressive test in a Formula 3000 car at Silverstone will have boosted his confidence further but he has yet to beat the flying Byford.

With every driver using examples of the Italian Dallara chassis, the gualifying sessions on Saturday will be critical as drivers try and find a balance between the tight, twisty section between the two hairpins and the fast run down the main straight and through the daunting Honda Curve. Starting from pole position will be a major advantage as the large fields pours into Hatchets Hairpin on the first lap of each of the races!

SUPPORTING RACES

Another championship set for a thrilling climax is the Dunlop Rover GTi Championship. The identical Rover 216 GTi's have produced some fine racing this season and seven different drivers have now won races.

One man yet to win a race, however, is Vince Martin who currently heads the points table by just two points from Mark Jones. This weekend, drivers will count their better score from the two races with the grid for race two being the finishing order from race one.

Spencer Baker - who won one of the races at Snetterton two weeks ago - is still in contention for the title in the car that his mentor Martin Short used to race in the series. Nuneaton chef Alfonso Emanuele and John Griffiths have also been winners and are still outside contenders for



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BRITISH FORMULA 3 CHAMPIONSHIP Permit No. CH95042.

The 1995 British Formula Three Championship is organised and administered by the British Racing Drivers' Club and the British Automobile Racing Club.

Formula 3 became an International category in 1950, for cars with 500cc engines. It was superseded by the 1/1.1 litre Formula Junior in 1960, then a new 1-litre Formula 3 was introduced for 1964, 1600cc (1971–73) to the current 2-litre (since 1974).

Specification: single-seater racing cars built to international F3 regulations, powered by 2-litre production based engines (developed from that of a recognised road car of which at least 5000 have been built), and running on control radial tyres (Avon). Class B cars must be designated as models from no earlier than 1992 and no later than 1994.

Awards at each round: Class A – 1st £750, 2nd £600, 3rd £450, 4th £400, 5th £350, 6th £300, 7th £275, 8th £250, 9th £200, 10th £150; Class B – 1st £575, 2nd £450, 3rd £375, 4th £325, 5th £250, 6th £225.

Points systems: 20–15–12–10–8–6–4–3–2–1 to the first ten finishers in each class, plus 1 for class fastest lap. Class B competitors are not eligible to score points in the Class A Championship. All championship rounds to count.
