In the last event of the day, Lampeter's Karl Jones, who was fifth fastest in practice, took a quiet sixth place in the Champion of Brands Formula Ford race.

Meanwhile, at Donnington, Lampeter's Tim Davies took fourth place in the Radio Trent Formula Ford 2000 race. Davies, who was sixth in practice, was seven seconds behind the third place man.

THE Wendy Wools British Special saloon car championship begins tomorrow at Brands Hatch after a midseason lull.
